Dear church family,

What's Love Got to Do with It?

This past month of course we celebrated Valentine's Day. Now how a 3rd century Christian martyr to the Romans got all involved in flowers, chocolates and romance is a story for another time. But love indeed has many forms and expressions. The ancient Greeks for example had a word, "phylous" which we have always thought as brotherly or family type of love, between members of the same household. But that is not the best translation of the term. The closest English word to the Greek concept of brotherly or family love is the term "charity". Which we would find in the KJV of how 1 Corith 13 is translated. "If I have not charity".

Today we normally think of the term, Charity, to imply some form giving, or dropping coins into a Salvation Army kettle or sending a check to a "charity". Paul had a far more broad and deeper level of the concept. What he is trying to communicate is that the closest and best form of God's love for us, and in turn the love we are to express to others is what the true meaning of charity implies. Grace, forgiveness, mercy and peace. And when you think about what Valentines' Day is supposed to be, it does make sense. For what value of a card, a box of chocolates or even telling someone, "I love you" if you do not extend to that same person the gifts of Grace, forgiveness, mercy or peace. If our actions do not back up our words, no matter the words of love, they ring hollow and meaningless.

Kris will tell you am I not the most external romantic person, never have been. I am far more happy with the practical, everyday expressions of love 364 days of the year, vice some special blowout dinner on 14 Feb. I am from the "if you love me then help me shovel out the drive way" person than, gee honey lets go to Golden Corral for the Friday special. But again, the lesson of this or any other Valentine's Day or month is deeds, not words. Show me, just don't tell me. Jesus said many, many things, many words. But those words would have been meaningless or nothing if he did not back those words up by a Cross and Empty Tomb. Ponder those words and His actions and what His "Valentine" is for you.



The Story of People Waving Palms to Jesus (from DTLK site for kids)

Devotion- Russ Topping

Russ's devotion was based on Matthew 20: 25-28. He read from the bible, and talked about how we are unfamiliar with serving, given our culture. The passage talks about serving God, and that serving should be dedicated to their master, and not to question the master. All servants are equal, and being a servant today is difficult. We tend to think of "me" first. What Matthew wants us to know is, that a servant gives up everything and to serve our master, which is God and Jesus. We should give everything up, and be good and faithful servants. This passage is to remind us that God is in control, and we should serve without reservation.

Clerks Correspondence and Session Mail Box- Susan McCloughan

Review of Minutes: Session reviewed the minutes from the November 16, 2020 Session Business Meeting. A **motion** was called to accept the Minutes as written. All were in favor. The approved Minutes will be sent to Sue/Church Office to be printed in the Book of Minutes and to be included in the Church Newsletter.

Calendar Highlights from December 2020- March 2021:

Pastor Dan is away the week between Christmas and New Year's. Rich Hopkins will be preaching on Sunday January 3rd. Due to Dan being away, Communion Sunday is now scheduled for Sunday January 10th.

The Annual Report submissions are due to the Church Office during the week of January 11th. Rich will talk to Brian Claus the leader of the Boy Scouts, to see if we they will be participating in Boy Scout Sunday on February 7th. Ash Wednesday is February 17th. Dan will speak with our sister church pastors to see if we will be participating in the Wednesday services during Lent. The First Sunday of Lent is February 21, 2021. The Annual Congregational Meeting is after church on 2/21/21. There is not going to be a pot-luck, due to the coronavirus. March 28, 2021 is Palm Sunday.

Worship and Music-Joanne DiBlasi

Ladies' Bible Study-Joanne talks about the bible study and how the ladies have met in the Library. So far so good, and the Ladies' Bible Study will continue.

Building and Grounds- Pat Durborow/Don Pidcock

There is no work being done on the kitchen or fence at this time. The façade or dental work around the church building will be worked on this spring. Nate McIntyre fixed the roof, but was patched only, more work to come to the church roof this spring as well. The chimney was removed from the church roof. Lights have been changed in the gym ceiling. Pat is in the process of getting in touch with someone to have our ice/snow removed in front of the church and gym area. Mitch Ege was our person who has done this, but he is no longer available.

During this past snowstorm, Phil McCloughan made himself available to remove the snow/ice in front of the church. A **motion** was brought forth to pay Phil for this snow removal. The idea is to get Phil a gift card, which Pat would take care of. The **motion** was approved.

Budget and Finance-Rich Hopkins

The Year-to-Date Summary wasn't discussed at tonight's meeting.

Church Budget for 2021- Rich spoke regarding the budget for 2021 and beyond. Handouts were given to Session for their review. The church needs a plan going forward, so the savings aren't depleted. Different ideas are being discussed, and the budget needs were talked about long term.

Dan talked about having a pledge drive. We have done this in the past. Sue will give Dan the pledge information. What does God want us to do? What is our vision and what should our congregation do in the future. Session also talked about the future, and the property of Westminster House. A **motion** was to approve the 2021 Budget. The **motion** was approved. The 2021 budget information is on file in the church office.

Dan spoke about having an outside group being brought into the church. This may help our financial situation as well. Session should pray on this.

Sunday School/Youth Group/Nominating Committee - Carol Griffiths

New Hope Community Church Youth Group- Is still meeting weekly. Maybe once our Friday Night Hang resumes in 2021, NH youth would like to get together with our church on Friday nights with our youth. This could not be done this year due to Covid-19.

Sunday School with our youth is still on hold, as well as the Junior Deacons.

Nominating Committee-Mark Dudick is the Elder Representative. Danielle Griffiths is the Deacon Representative. Joanne DiBlasi will send an email or call Mark to see how the Nominating Committee is going.

Moderator Time-Rev. Dan Dorrow

The Christmas Eve service was discussed. Music is planned with readers. The service will also include the candlelight service. The Deacons are in charge, passing out the candles to the congregation. Dan asked for Ushers to make sure that seating is done so that social distancing can be followed. Make masks available for those who may not have them. The December 27th service is not a sermon, but "Testimony Time." A few members from our congregation will be sharing their stories. The two fold bulletin will be used for this service.

Minutes of Session Meeting 7PM January 13, 2021 via Zoom

Devotion - Dan read Psalm 23.

Worship and Music – Joanne reported that services were running smoothly all things considered. She also reminded session to keep Joe Feraco and Grace Hendricks in mind for communion visits when their respective facilities open again for visitation. Dan raised the possibility of increasing the frequency of having communion. Currently, communion is celebrated monthly. Session agreed to pray about this and to discuss further at the February session meeting.

<u>Buildings</u> and <u>Grounds</u> – Pat reported that since there was no fall clean-up outside, the gardens will be cleaned and mulched in the spring. Cooie continues to work on the water damage to the drop ceiling in the gym. Pat bought a gift card for Phil as a thank you from session for his work in removing the ice from the sidewalks in front of the church after the recent storm. Christmas decorations will be removed from the sanctuary at the end of January.

<u>Budget and Finance</u> – Heather is working on the final reports for 2020 and will forward them to session upon completion. Rich agreed to look into the possibility of a PPP loan/grant as a result of the most recent stimulus package passed by the federal government. A discussion followed on paying church volunteers. Session agreed we are blessed by the many volunteers who keep our church running on a weekly basis. For 2021, it was agreed that piano/organ substitutes for Sundays would be paid as follows: \$100 will be paid to substitutes who attend FPCL, and \$250 will be paid to substitutes who are outside professionals. A **motion** made by Heather and seconded by Carol.

<u>Covid Updates</u> – Session agreed that the Sunday services for January 17th and January 24th will be done via Zoom. In-person services will resume on January 31st. Dan proposed a 2-person committee to inform the congregation on all Covid-related issues. Russ and Heather volunteered to serve. The committee will contact the congregation using multiple methods, including texts, emails and snail mail. There will also be a voluntary sign-up sheet placed in the back of the church before each Sunday service for attendees who wish to be contacted regarding any new Covid-related exposures within the congregation. The list will only be used for that purpose. Future emails from the office will include our Covid guidelines at the bottom. An additional guideline to be added will ask the congregation to please not attend Sunday services if they may have been exposed.
